#### College and Technical School Visits

As students are planning for their future, it is important that they consider their career plans and any necessary post-secondary education. Touring the campus of a school that they are considering is one of the best ways to know if that institution is a good fit for their future. Some ideas for questions that they might want to ask on a tour can be found <u>here</u>. A little planning helps to make the most of the college visit.

#### **PSATS AND MORE**

It can sometimes seem overwhelming to think about the various tests and the acronyms that are part of the post-secondary planning process. At Forest Area, all 11th grade students take the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test). This test is given at school and is essentially a practice test so that students have a better understanding of what the SAT test that is required for admission to many colleges and universities is like.

Students may also choose to take the SAT (Scholastic Assessment Test) or the ACT (American College Testing). Either of these tests is usually accepted for the admission requirements for four year colleges and universities. These help admissions staff to evaluate student knowledge on a level playing field and may also be used to help determine course placement for students.

ASVAB (Armed Service Vocational Aptitude Battery) testing is offered through the US military branches and provides information about student achievement levels. ASVAB scores are used primarily to determine enlistment eligibility, assign applicants to military jobs and aid students in career exploration.

The school counselor can provide a lot of information about these tests and how they may benefit your specific student. Please contact Mrs. Pasinski to talk about what options are the most suitable for your student.









#### **STREAM**

STREAM projects encompass Science, Technology, Research, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics. They encourage higher level thinking skills like asking questions and forming theories while providing students with hands-on learning opportunities. Precise measuring and planning, physical skills, and problem solving are the focus of STREAM projects.

Retired teacher Mr. John Lewis is helping Mrs. Lisa Schmidt's third grade class at West Forest Elementary School to build ukuleles provided by Stewart MacDonald and funded through a grant from PASR.

In Mr. Brad Roth's fourth grade Science class at East Forest, students are building physical representations of various atoms with the help of some toothpicks and marshmallows.

What does it take to succeed in life outside of the classroom? Students in the Forest Area School District are working to learn skills that help them make it through the summer months and in years following graduation!

East Forest Pre-K students were able to see the recycling truck as the conclusion of a lesson on recycling. The recycling dumpster at East Forest was added as the result of an Ice House project completed by Nick Geraci and Aidan Faust last year.

Third and fourth graders at West Forest Elementary School have received a Proper Grant for swimming lessons. They traveled to the Oil City YMCA for their lessons. #### SCHEDULING FOR 2024 - 2025

Our principals and school counselors have begun the scheduling process for next year. If you have a high school student, please remember to consider the options for dual enrollment courses. We have agreements with the Northern PA Regional College, University of Pittsburgh at Bradford and PennWest that students can consider in their future plans.

Ninth grade students participated in tours of the Venango Technology Center in Oil City. Beginning in tenth grade, students can enroll in a number of programs from HVAC to welding to Dental Assisting and more. New this year is the Early Childhood Education program where students can start preparing for a career in teaching preschool or early elementary grades.
